### BOARD OF GOVERNOR'S MEETING

The BOG convened at the Sand Springs Community Center on 05 May 2008. Governors present were Tina Birch, Jo Ann Chandler, Steve Elliott, Tucky Patz, and later, Kenny Baggett.

Welcome: Jo Ann called the meeting to order at 6:35 pm and welcomed member guests Richard Ferguson, Darline Hobock and Jack Stewart as well as prospective member Mike Dickson and his son Matthew. Introductions were made around the table.

The Dickson boat is a water-balanced Hunter 26. Mike bought the boat not knowing how to sail and he and Matthew both look forward to our summer learning programs. An application and fees were paid; however, at the time there was not a quorum of Governors so Jo Ann will discuss the application with the Board electronically.

Seeking support from the BOG, Richard Ferguson presented a calendar idea from the MS Regatta Committee. Twelve slots, one for each month, will be auctioned with the high bidders winning a spot for their own sailing picture in the calendar. The Board was receptive to the idea and agreed to vote on the proposal once more details were available.

Secretary's Report: Tina passed out copies of the April 2008 minutes as submitted to the Windword. After discussion and correction, Tucky moved the minutes be approved. Kenny voiced a second; the minutes were approved as corrected.

Facilities Manager's Report: Jack spoke of the damage from the high water and wind storms over the last two weeks. The overall damage is the worst Jack's seen: four Hydrohoists were severely damaged, A Dock walkway has numerous boards missing, D Dock is damaged in more than one place, and the centerboard tie-up dock's articulating

steel arm had to detach and let fall. Repair estimates will be sought and an analysis of the club's insurance will ensue.

Jack voiced his pleasure of all the Work Party's efforts, saying there was a lot of really nice work done. RC II is working out well. It is a work in progress with a few minor changes to be made as well as paperwork to be handled, but said when all is done, it will come in under budget. Jack inquired what the BOG would like to do with the old RC, stating that there is value in salvage. Jo Ann will add this to the electronic Board discussion.

Treasurer's Report: None received. Activities Captain's Report: Tucky has placed a few logo orders for individuals. She is working with A&B Engraving Company saying they are very accommodating. Tucky is actively looking into nylon jackets, fleece vests and nylon vests w/internal quilting. If you would like some WSC logo wear, please contact Tucky at activities.captain@windycrest.com. Search for a location for our Christmas party is ongoing, with her most recent tour of the Post Oak Lodge. Fleet Captain's Report: Kenny will organize one last RC Build Committee meeting inviting the crew to attend, trying for a week from tonight, to go over items they talked about yet still need to purchase. The Centerboard 1&2 races had to be moved to first make up week in August. The next event is the Spring Open and Kenny hopes it will be well attended. 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### MONDAY MORNING SKIPPER

REPRINTED FROM A WINDYCREST YAHOO GROUP EMAIL, APRIL 1ST (BUT IT'S NO JOKE)

The first racing of the season was a big hit, even though the weather outside looked chilly and wet. Twelve boats hit the line for the first races of the season. The drizzle faded away before the competitors left the docks and the wind was blowing nicely at 8-10 mph out of the southeast for the first race. After one general recall race one was underway. Left was the side to play and Terry Rainey on his S2 7.9 led around the first mark. Ken Madewell on his J22 was second with a pack of boats right behind. Madewell and Roger Kerr (Merit 25) gybed away first to sail for a clear lane downwind. Things were looking pretty good for a while with Madewell edging ahead of Rainey about halfway down, but new wind came from the left side and Rainey pulled ahead at the leeward mark. Rainey and Madewell sailed up the middle the second leg, Roger K took the right side and Elizabeth Paszkiewicz (J22) along with a few others hit the left side and it paid big. Sherwin/Potter (Viper) rounded 1st at the top mark followed closely by Madewell, Paszkewicz, Rainey. The Viper crossed the line first, Madewell 40 seconds behind, Paszkiewicz 23 seconds after, Rainey, the Lows (Capri 25), and R.Kerr. Britt Williams (S20) sailed a terrific race and I believe corrected out over all boats by a hair. Everyone had some relaxing reaches across the lake enjoying beverages and snacks while we waited for the second race to commence.

The winds picked up a little for the second race- 10-15 mph. Everyone wanted to be left and there was a huge log jam at the pin. Madewell got shut out at the pin and went on around with a few seconds left on the countdown. Williams tried to make the pin and I do not believe it worked out. Madewell sailed below everyone out on port tack and waited for a small starboard lift to get back to the left side. Things are a little blurry for me after that, but I believe Sherwin/Potter made it to the windward mark in front after a couple of crossings with Madewell. The Viper really got smoking on the downwind run, but after their gybe for the leeward mark their spinnaker shredded. This allowed Madewell to get by and stretch out their lead over the pack. Madewell crossed the line first followed by Paszkiewicz, R.Kerr, Sherwin/Potter, and Rainey. Williams made a nice recovery from the slow start and corrected out 2nd place for

We had 55-60 people out on the water and it was great sit-

ting around the pavilion catching up with everyone after the races. A group straggled up to the building to catch a glimpse of the new committee boat. It is going to be fantastic! If you didn't get to make it out last Sunday, put it on your calendar to be out this Sunday. # TUESDAY MORNING SKIPPER CENTERBOARD EDITION - MAY 27TH

Centerboard Spring 5&6 had great weather. Sunny skies, winds out of the south @ 12-17 mph with 10-15 degree shifts. Britt Williams and crew set up some great race courses. Eight MCs, 2 Thistles, and 3 Sunfish made it out to the water. I had my top crew Ethan with me, so I did not pay as much attention around the course as normal. Harvey Baker tried out his sail with a reef in it and seemed to have pretty good speed going upwind.

Ethan and I got off the line quickly on starboard by the pin and sailed out to the first shift and were able to tack across most of the fleet. Fred Morgan was the first boat around the windward mark followed by myself, Darrel Daniel, Bob McGinnis, Stephan Gent, and Harvey Baker. Bob found the hot lane downwind passing 3 boats and rounded 1st inside of me at the leeward mark. Ethan and I worked our way back left, getting on starboard tack whenever we had the opportunity. Drew Ziegler unfortunately found himself on the west side of the course and had a very hard time trying to get back. Most of the shifts were coming from the left and sometimes it was worth tacking on a starboard header to get to new wind coming from the left. We rounded the top mark with a comfortable lead and sailed on to win the race. Darrel finished 2nd, Bob 3rd, and Harvey 4th.

Britt didn't waste any time with the Sunfish fleet and got them started on a longer 2nd race before we were able to finish. I'm sure they appreciated a longer 2nd race. Lisa Weatherholt and Chris Gill traded 1sts and 3rds in this fleet with Mike Choquette earning 2 2nds.

The pin was really favored for the 2nd race of the day and Ethan and I were to the line a little too early. In trying to burn off time, we burned a little too much and ended up a little late and Stephen rolled us at the start. We bailed onto port as quickly as we could and tacked below some starboard tackers to get clear air. I believe Harvey got to the windward mark first. I can't remember where everyone rounded (including us), but the fleet was very tight. I believe this was the rounding that Stephan forgot to ease the vang before the windward mark and turned over as he was trying to round. Ethan and I caught a couple of good shafts of wind as it started to really blow and sailing by the lee was definitely fast. We rounded the leeward mark with a 7-10 boat length lead. About 1/2 way up the next leg Harvey and I worked the left side pretty hard tacking several times trying to get into

what seemed to be a little stronger thin shaft of air. I don't know if it paid off or not as Darrel played the left as well, but did not make the short tacks and seemed to come out just fine if not gaining some on Harvey. Harvey and Darrel rounded the top mark very close to each other and might have changed positions a couple of times going downwind. Ethan and I rounded the leeward mark with a little too comfortable lead as we held a very loose cover on Harvey and Darrel working the right side on the way to the finish line. The wind did kick right and Harvey and Darrel made up a bunch of ground on us. We ended up first with Harvey 2nd, and Darrel 3rd.

The centerboard fleet has the rare two weekend races in a row as they are catching back up to the schedule and finishing out the Spring Series. Come out and join us; the more the merrier!!

Addendum by Lisa W: Starting the Sunfish fleet prior to the other centerboard boats' next start was a great idea. We appreciated that bit of creative thinking:

### ABOUT SCOTT, OUR SEAGOING GRANDSON

Bennie and I are very proud of Scott. He never went to college, mostly was a busboy and waited tables when he got out of high school where he was on the swim team, his best academic subject. Both Marshall and Carol, his parents, are sailors, not to mention us grandparents, and he grew up sailing; they have always had a sailboat.

He set off to Costa Rica-I guess to seek his fortuneand met up with a charter boat owner and Captain
who also had a lot of business interests onshore. He
hired Scott as Mate but very shortly realized his experience and capability and turned the boat over to him
and pursued his other interests. After a year or so of
taking charters out, the wanderlust overtook Scott
and he found a berth on a boat headed for Panama
and from there, another to the Islands, and finally to
Newport where he got involved in trans-Atlantic racing. Once he wrote that they lost a stay out in the middle of the Atlantic and he climbed the mast in a gale
to repair it!

While he was in Great Britain he realized that he needed more education, so he enrolled and spent a year completing courses in all the seagoing arts to the end that he received his Masters papers as well as Engineer. He prefers to sail as the Engineer, less responsibility I would imagine. He has incorporated himself and taken out a million-dollar liability bond which enables him to command a higher salary since the owner/employer does not have those worries.

For the past four years he has been Engineer on Shamrock V, a J-Boat built in 1929 for Sir Thomas Lipton for the Americas Cup races. Lipton died the following year. It has since had many owners and many refits, one which included the installation of twin diesels, generators and water making equipment in engineering spaces not designed for such. It was in dry dock in Italy for several months which gave him the opportunity to enjoy snowboarding in the Alps and to entertain his parents at the Winter Olympics when they were held in Italy. After the long stay in dry dock the wooden hull leaked like a sieve until it swelled

tight again. After things were once again shipshape, he decided that he needed a vacation and left Shamrock V, came home for Christmas and has been in Canada-what else-snowboarding.

The captain of the Windrose found out where Scott was and called him. He asked Scott to come to Antigua and serve as his Engineer. I considered that quite a compliment. The Windrose (http://www.superyachtsociety.com/windrose/defaul t.htm) has departed Antigua and is presently in mid-Atlantic en route to France for a two-week stay in dry dock, at the end of which the owner will join them and spend the summer cruising the Mediterranean. Tough life!


