


Vice Commodore's Report

We are in the middle of summer and the heat has not been that bad yet (knock on wood). I think the high in the next few days is to be less than 90 degrees which is wonderful. Night sailing is also a nice way to beat the heat of summer. We recently had a beach party that was the perfect opportunity for just that occasion. If you did not attend you missed a great sail. If you are out sailing in the heat be sure and drink lots of fluids because it is easy to become over heated this time of year and be sure to use that sunscreen.

We had a bit of a blow on one of our centerboard racing day. The race committee quickly shorten course and got us headed in, the major group reaching the dock just about the time that a 50 mph gust reaching us. The dock had about 8 MC's tied to the dock and one small keelboat. Someone had untied one of the lines that secure the end of the dock, with that much weight and the high winds it caused part of the dock to buckle. Jack did a nice job of repair. The moral of the story if you do not know what the line is for please do not untie them. We also have a group of gentlemen that are re-anchoring the docks and have floats and lines tied to them, please do not bother any line that you are not sure what goes to.

We have also had a problem people leaving their boats tie to the docks for extended periods of time. If you are on a mooring you are required to return it to the mooring. You are able to tie your boat for a maximum of 48 hrs. If for some reason you are not able to return your boat in that 48 hrs. You need to notify me the reason and get permission and let me know the estimated time that it will need to stay on the dock.


Rear Commodore's Report

Art flew over 150 combat missions over North Vietnam. Flying an F-4 Phantom II from the deck of the USS Midway aircraft carrier, his book puts you in the cockpit as he evades AAA and Surface-to-Air Missiles, lands on a pitching deck in the middle of a typhoon, and comes close to losing his life and a \$12 million aircraft. You'll also ride along with Top Gun pilots as they engage enemy MiGs in dog fights over the then most heavily defended area in the entire world .

Readers have said the book is as close to real combat as they have ever experienced.

Introduction of guests: Jo Ann Chandler, Art Long, Richard Ferguson (webmaster), John Kerr, Jr.

Art Long presented a proposal to offer his book "Tail-End Charlie", a story of his personal experience of air combat in Vietnam, for donations to APOS. Details of this proposal will be posted in the Windword.
