How the Sail for Steve Regatta Raffle Changed My Life

When I was eight years old, I won a teakettle in a raffle celebrating a new shopping mall. For the next 45 years, I never won another random prize. Not a PTA raffle, not a church drawing, not an office pool, not the Publishers Clearing House. But then it happened. A handful of raffle tickets changed everything at the Sail for Steve charity regatta. I won Paul Foerster. Olympic sailing champion, multi-gold medalist, totally nice guy, Paul Foerster. For one whole afternoon racing about Keystone Lake, luck made Paul Foerster all mine to coach me and my crew on how to sail like an Olympic champ.

Here's how it all happened from beginning to end on the morning of September 9. The usual big crowd was gathered in the Windycrest pavilion for the event preliminaries, the welcomes, the thanks, the introductions of the many who supported ALS patients by turning out. Then came the raffle drawing, and I'm just milling about waiting for this all to end so I can insincerely congratulate some lucky winner and get on with the racing. At last, Steve and Mary Snider dive into the bucket of tickets and begin the drawing. The first ticket – not mine naturally – wins a ridiculously expensive cooler. Another wins a hat or something. Again, not mine, of course. On it went for half a dozen more prizes and not-mine's.

Everything else given away, the time came for the biggest prize of the day – Paul Foerster himself. The crowd quieted. Steve and Mary reach in. The mic goes over to Steve, "A day with three-time Olympic sailing gold medalist Paul Foerster goes to ... goes to ... David Hyman." Well smack me with a spinnaker pole. Quick, run down to the boat and clean it up. Coil the lines. Take out the good dishes. The universe has shifted; this is no teapot. This is big-time stuff. Can't let Paul Foerster think we are sailboat rubes. No, can't do that; have to be on our best. If Steve Elliott can think I steer like a dolt, what will the great Paul Foerster think? We don't even have matching team t-shirts. Oh, lordy, this ain't going to go well.

Well, it wasn't like that at all. We had a blast with Paul. Right away, he was one of us, cutting up and chatting easily about everything. My crew and Paul hit it off immediately. All of us — my son, Jonathan Hyman (former WSC junior Opti champ), my friend Steve Elliott, and hearty young midshipman Ben Hoel -- had a wonderful time with him. Paul was generous with his knowledge and sailing tales, and each of us was rewarded with a bit of Paul's sailing know-how and insights on how to make a sailboat go.

Paul took the middle crew position tending the mainsheet; but mostly he was the orchestra conductor directing sail trim, course adjustment, start timing and position. He patiently recommended steering advice to me, he encouraged Jonathan on the winches, and he and Steve – no sailing slouch himself – wrapped themselves into some pretty friendly yet high-level talk about sailing tactics and theory. And Paul was particularly kindly and supportive of young Ben. Here's an example of something I unexpectedly learned from Paul – you can roll tack a 4,000-pound keelboat. Really, it can be done; but it works much better with an Olympic gold medalist showing how to do it.

With Paul on board we did pretty darned well in the afternoon's racing. Not only did I win Paul himself, but with him we won the whole regatta. After so long, so much winning all at once was almost too much to bear.

- Rules: The series will be governed by the rules as defined in The Racing Rules of Sailing (RRS), except as any of these are changed by the sailing instructions, and by rules of the authority governing the waters on which the event is sailed. - Eligibility & Entries: Eligible boats are remote control wind powered CR914 Class sailing boats.

- ***No Racing December 24th***
- 5. Weather: If at Noon of the race day the temperature is colder than 40F or wind gusts are greater than 20 mph, racing for that day will be cancelled. If the pond surface is frozen, racing that day is cancelled. The Fleet Captain will notify of cancellations via text message.
- Notices to Competitors: Notices to competitors will be made orally prior to racing that day. Notices may also be emailed to participants or sent via text message using info supplied by the participant during registration.
- Changes to the Rules: The sailing instructions may modify the rules.
- 8. Prizes: Bragging rights are available.
- Scoring: The regatta will be scored using the Low Point system of Appendix A, except as modified by the sailing instructions.
