
A Note from the Commodores Desk



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Windycrest's old A-Dock and its slips are gone now and the club is considering a plan to replace it. You might be interested!



Please contact the Commodore very soon.

Financing: In the past, Windycrest financed new docks that have slips through a cooperative arrangement between the club and the individual members who rent the slips. Under that arrangement, the club paid part of the construction cost and each slip renter paid up front a proportionate share of the rest and then paid no annual rent for several years. We anticipate that financing slips on the new A-Dock would follow this pattern and would work as follows (these numbers are speculative; the actual amounts will depend on the final design and cost):

• A new dock with 10 slips might cost \$80,000.

• The club would pay one-third of the cost (\$26,667) and each slip renter would pay \$5,334 up front ((80,000-26,667)/10=5,334).

• Then, based upon projected annual slip rent of \$762, a renter would make no annual rent payment for a period of 7 years (5,334/762=7 years). A \$50 annual slip maintenance fee would nevertheless be owed.

Limited Commitment: A slip renter would not be committed to rent for the entire period and could vacate the slip before the end of the period. In that case, the "unused" remainder of the initial payment would be refunded and the next renter would pay an amount equal to the refunded amount and continue under the same terms as the original renter.

A decision about a new A-Dock is imminent; if you are interested in possibly having a slip on a new A-Dock, please don't wait to let us know.

As 2021 began, it was time to send dues statements—the secretary, Margaret Hamlett Shinn, spent many hours checking the accuracy of our records and sending out statements. We keep several types of records (spreadsheets), to track where everyone's boats and trailers are. She had to check on each member's records—most are easy—and sometimes there was conflicting information. These deviations come from various sources. Perhaps human error, but often members make changes and informal agreements with other members. Perhaps BOG officer responses have been misinterpreted. I am very grateful that the previous Vice Comm (now Commodore) David Hyman did a yeoman's job in a most difficult year (2020!) by keeping a high level of accuracy.

I spent quite a few hours walking every boat lot, the travel trailers, and all the docks, I talked to members. I was concerned with the accuracy of our records, but was also able to assist Margaret using the newly-acquired information. Sooo interesting in sooo many ways ... and it leads to this: IF YOU ARE MAKING A CHANGE—pulling a boat from a slip for maintenance work, selling/ buying, removing a boat for any reason—INFORM THE VICE COMMODORE (me) or at least any BOG member.

We have Club Rules – general conduct, BOG rules, boat storage rules, & Trailer & RV rules. All of our decisions are made accordingly. Sometimes the finer points are difficult to understand, *so ask us!* I have asked the Commodore & Past Commodore MANY questions in order to properly apply the rules as I direct slip or boat lot assignments. We have Waiting Lists available for view on the website—again, call/text/email me for clarification. Every organization has rules, just sayin'.

I don't have any anecdotes this time; you'll have to read David's articles--he usually has an amusing tale. This is it for now: Some of my best Christmas gifts were a bow guide (dock protector) and some corner bumpers. To fend off sexists who may say 'what do you expect from a woman driver', I will remind you that there is NO engine on our J22 so we sail in & out of the slip. **As I often say, these are learned skills** that can be practiced and perfected.

REMINDER: Windycrest is Windycrest twelve months a year. Come on out and take a walk or a little hike. It benefits our mental health! Check your trailer tires and boat covers. Walk the docks if you like. Some members spend a lot of winter hours fishing. I am surprised at how many folks are out. Lots of winter days are quite nice. **Start scheming NOW for 2021 Windycrest fun.**

Greetings,

It's still cold outside. Daylight is in short supply. We're all hunkered down. But, all of that is soon about to change. That's right, Spring is coming! We can expect more Oklahoma cold spells, but days are getting longer and every now and again there's a breath of warmth in the wind. We'll be on the water soon enjoying the beauty and splendour of Lake Keystone. With that happy thought in mind, plans are taking shape for racing and sailing activities in 2021.

The recent Fleet Captain meeting was successful with good participation and lively discussion on the topic of the upcoming season and what kinds of racing events we'd like to do. First and foremost, there was wide agreement to do all we can to encourage participation from all members of the club, not just the racing folks. Events that are accessible to everyone interested in sailing, those who want to learn to sail, or hone their skills, or maybe just go out and enjoy sailing for the fun of it, not just all about racing. With that in mind, some plans came together for some fun events:

- Corinthian Semi long-distance race/cruise series. Casual, easy, low stress, and hopefully fun, the series will consist of 5 holiday races: St. Patrick's Day, Memorial Day, 4th of July, August 22 (a holiday), and Labor Day. Best three races in the series determines the winner. The format will place the starting line near the no-wake buoy in the cove. Two marks will be set, one to the north and one to the south, distance between and location of the marks will be determined by the general strength and direction of the wind. Competitors can start any time after 11am but must finish by 3:30pm. It will be up to the competitor to best navigate the course. Each boat must start, round both marks, and finish. The hope is that members will see this as a low stress, fun way to enjoy sailing together. This format is perfect for getting families out on the holiday to enjoy their sailboat and we will encourage that by offering prizes for top family crews as well as top overall scorers.
- Extended Wednesday Night Race Series with Starting Training. 10 races between May and July complete the series this season with best 5 races in the series determining the winner. In response to an interest in honing racing skills, we plan to incorporate training in the form of starting practice prior to each Wednesday night race. The idea would be to gather on the line at least 45 minutes prior to the official race start time for some informal practice starts. Faux race starts will be run at 2-minute intervals to allow for plenty of practice. By the time the official race starts, we'll all be well practiced and ready!




Did I say we have nice chairs for people to sit in at our booth!







