Word From the Stern Deck

With covid-19 hopefully beginning to abate, we might even start easing back into the social activities that we once enjoyed. So, go get your vaccine, find your sailing gloves, dig out your sunscreen, and come sailing! It is still the safest way to spend an afternoon so long as you don't get too close to the folks in the next slip.



Our first and covid-safe event of the year, the Third Annual St. Patrick's Day Regatta, was a phenomenal good time. Twenty boats sailed a long circuit around the lake and then everyone returned to the pavilion for a socially-distant Irish spread that would warm the cockles of St. Pat's own heart. The leprechauns on the committee boats and behind the bar did it all just right. Special thanks to members Jason Williams, Molly Richardson and Michelle Young who conjured the shepherd's pie, Irish coffee and green cookies, and to RC members Stu Bernd and Grant Gerondale who skillfully ran the race.



There are some big decisions soon to be made about our facilities — decisions that we hope will lead to making our grounds even better than they are now. Here's a rundown of what's on the table:

A Dock — As you know from previous reports, we are considering the replacement of A Dock. If possible, we are hoping to have a new dock with ten slips and room for launching tie-ups. Our request for proposals was sent to about 25 dock contractors, all of whom are on the GRDA's list of approved contractors. The deadline for submission of proposals should have passed by the time you read this and we will have begun evaluating them. We hope to make a decision whether to proceed with the project by the summer.

C Dock — We are considering changes to the C Dock platform and gangway in order to make them more substantial and functional. At our request a structural engineer recently examined the structure, and we expect his report and recommendation soon. Then, if we consider his recommendation appropriate, we hope that we can implement it at an early date.

Bathhouse — Several members have recommended that the bathhouse and the area around it be upgraded to create a gathering place for members especially when the Corps of Engineers blesses us with very high water. The plans for this are in the earliest stages, and like the previous two projects, we will be evaluating this with a hope of improving that facility as soon as possible.

It is needless to say that there is much to do before any final decisions are possible for these possible projects. Basically, we must determine the comparative urgency and cost of each, as well as our ability to pay. In a nutshell, it all comes down to our priorities. As we move forward during the coming weeks, please feel free to contact me with your thoughts about any of these.

FROM AROUND THE WORLD AND YOUR OWN BACKYARD. Not all news is sailing news. Some is just fun information.



THERE BE MONSTERS THERE — A TRIP UNDER THE the Windex slid quietly below the first girder and we glided **BRIDGE**

The Corps of Engineers unstoppered Keystone Lake a few weeks ago and lowered the water more than it had been in many years. They said it was to laser-scan the bottom to find how much silt had accumulated. Some say it was to find lost Ray Bans. Whatever the Corps was really up to, it was finally my chance to sail under The Bridge with my 37 foot high mast tip and discover what's beyond Highway 412.

In all my time at Windycrest, I had never sailed to the North side of The Bridge, so all cruising went like this: leave the cove, turn South, sail three miles to The Bridge, turn North and sail toward Cleveland. Or go the other way around. Really nice, but not very adventuresome. Beyond the Highway 412 bridge, however, was terra incognita — the unknown land. There might be the edge of the Earth on the other side. Dragons might live there. People with three heads and wings. New brands of beer. I had to go there.

Thus my adventure under The Bridge began. On a perfect early March afternoon with a pleasant breeze and an endless inviting sky beyond Highway 412 we put on our brave faces, left a final note on the dock just in case, and took off. One port tack took us from Windycrest cove nearly to The Bridge. Nearing the concrete pilings, we slowed to a drift to make one last survey of our chances and, stomach in throat, we headed in. I heard Gandalf the wizard bellow. "You. Shall. Not. Pass!" but it was only a semi honking above us. I truly expected the mast to grind against steel and a rigging crash at any second. But just as suddenly

smoothly ahead. We were under The Bridge.

From the cockpit of a sailboat it's absolutely impossible to judge the distance between your mast tip and something directly above it. Whatever the actual distance is, it invariably looks like there is no gap at all. This is a fact of science and it applies equally to bridges, power lines and Grant Gerondale's airplane. Though I had carefully calculated that we would have plenty of room to safely pass under The Bridge [formula: (bridge elevation) - (water level) -(mast-tip-to-waterline distance) = clearance], as we passed under the bridge, it looked as if we'd hit every one of the overhead steel girders under the roadway. But my arithmetic was better than my eyesight and we cleared under The Bridge white-knuckled and with rigging intact. With that, a rainbow appeared (it really did) and we sailed confidently into the broad sea beyond The Bridge. One bass boat roared past us; but there were no monsters.

Many Windycresters have masts that don't prevent an adventure beyond The Bridge. They are the fortunate ones; but I'm not one of them. Sadly, the lake is back; so, like Moses, I now can only look beyond The Bridge, but not sail there. Not to make too much of my adventure beyond The Bridge, but it reminded me of a part of John Keats' poem

On First Looking Into Chapman's Homer. "Then felt I like some watcher of the skies When a new planet swims into his ken; Or like stout Cortez when with eagle eyes He star'd at the Pacific—and all his men Look'd at each other with a wild surmise..."

Classes: All boats welcome. Three boats in the same class make a fleet. All others sail in an appropriate handicap fleet.

Rules: The ISAF Racing Rules of Sailing 2021-2024 under (section. 2 rules) as adopted and amended by US SAILING, CSSA Sailing Instructions and the Local Appendix will govern races. A boat entering as a member of a class must conform to class rules.

<u>Safety:</u> Standard safety equipment required including throwables and signaling device (16ft+ boats). No racing in winds greater than sustained 15 mph. All boats must be self-rescuing. <u>All participants must wear masks while on shore and maintain 6' Social Distancing.</u>

Scoring: Low point system:
1 for 1st, 2 for 2nd, 3 for 3rd, etc.
DNF= # of finishers in fleet +1 point
DNS= # of entries in fleet

DSQ= # of entries in fleet + 1 point

Boats must have a sail number to be scored.

<u>Handicapping:</u> Current US SAILING Portsmouth System. Skippers should verify that a US SAILING Portsmouth D-PN number has been established for their boat.

<u>Trophies:</u> 1st place for 3 boat fleets, 2nd place for 5 boat fleets, and 3rd place in 7 boat fleets, 4th place for 9 boat fleets and 5th place for 11 boat fleets.

Housing: Free camping at Club with bathhouse. Hotels in Sand Springs and Cabins at Keystone State Park.

Facilities: Clubhouse, modern bathhouse, boat ramp, ample parking, mast-raising device, tie-up dock and end of slip space for overnight in the water.

Food & Drink: Currently No food or drinks are planned to be provided due to COVID 19.

Entry Fees and Costs: \$10.00 per person participating. Single handed \$10, double \$20, triple \$30, etc. Junior sailors (17 and under) sail for free. This pricing is to cover trophies. We are planning to get good trophies.

Now, as of the day I am writing this, the lake is nearly ten feet above the 723' normal elevation. Nonetheless, all the docks are comfortably accessible.
